Discover Treasure Storytime Packet

Travel with us and discover some suggested reads, rhymes, fingerplays, and crafts centered around hunting for treasure.

All suggested reads can be found in the Brevard County Public Library System and are available to be checked out.

This packet consists of two fully developed storytimes: Babies & Toddlers, and Preschool. Each storytime can be used for any age though and are great for early literacy enrichment and education.

Why storytime?

- Literacy development starts early in life and is highly correlated with school achievement.
- Reading and storytelling with your child promotes brain development and imagination, teaches your child about language and emotions, and strengthens your relationship.
- You don't always need to read books! Try looking at picture books, singing rhymes and songs, or telling stories from your culture.

Babies & Toddlers Storytime

Suggested Books:

"I Love My Pirate Papa" by Laura Leuck

Rhyme/Movement: Treasure Hunt

This fun baby activity was modified from the classic rhyme. Caregivers do the movements on baby's tummy. Great for baby storytimes, but also works for toddlers and preschoolers who can do the motions on themselves or on each other!

We're going on a treasure hunt (drag fingers down back)

X marks the spot (draw big X on back)

Three lines down, with a dot, dot, dot (make 3 lines down back)

Gold and jewels (open one hand, then the other)

And so much more (tickle tummy)

With a pinch (light pinch with thumb and forefinger)

And a squeeze (light squeeze with both hands)

And a tropical breeze (blow on nape of the neck)

Now you've got the shivers!

Fingerplay: Five Little Pirates

Five little pirates heading out to shore. One jumped overboard and now there

are four. (fold one finger down)

One stole the captain's gold and now there are three. (fold one finger down)

Three little pirates with not a lot to do.

for treasures (look through spyglass)

If you're a pirate and you know it, say

ahoy: Ahoy! (with arm movement)

now there are two. (fold one finger

Two little pirates having lots of fun.

One drank all the first mate's juice and

now there is one. (fold one finger down)

One little pirate sitting in the sun.

He decided to abandon ship and now

there are none. (fold one finger down)

Rhyme/Movement: One-Eyed Jake

This is a fun cumulative song for preschoolers. Children try to stay upright while performing more and more pirate movements.

And gave their captain a fright (cover mouth with hands)

Home Activity

Craft Stick Puzzle Treasure Map

Home Supplies:

- 6 to 12 craft sticks
- Painters or masking tape
- Markers

Instructions:

- 1. Line up enough craft sticks flat on a surface to make a small rectangle.
- 2. Number them and tape them together.




3. Flip the whole craft stick rectangle over and design your map using the markers. Be careful not to decorate your map with things that would glue the sticks together such as paint or glitter.



4. Remove the tape and assemble the map to find your treasure!

Treasure: something that is very special, important, or valuable (sometimes hidden in a safe place)
