We are shaking things up a bit with our Summer Reading Program 2021!

In this week's Storytime Packet, our theme is the Ocean! Travel with us and discover some suggested reads, rhymes, fingerplays, and crafts centered around life under the sea and on the shoreline.

All suggested reads can be found in the Brevard County Public Library System and are available to be checked out.

This packet consists of two fully developed storytimes: Babies & Toddlers, and Preschool. Each storytime can be used for all ages though and are for early literacy enrichment and education at home.

Why storytime?

- Literacy development starts early in life and is highly correlated with school achievement.
- Reading and storytelling with your child promotes brain development and imagination, teaches your child about language and emotions, and strengthens your relationship.
- You don't always need to read books! Try looking at picture books, singing rhymes and songs, or telling stories from your culture.

(elbows together, bring forearms together like jaws snapping)

(open & close outstretched arms like a whale's mouth)


Song: "Row, Row, Row Your Boat"

Ocean Learning Activities:

Share goldfish crackers. (only if baby is safely eating solids)
Have fun making the fish swim, chase, and 'glub'. Try counting and sorting the fish if multi colored crackers are available.

Take a walk on the beach, or along the Indian River Lagoon. Identify seagulls, birds, crabs, shells. Bring a few shells home. Count and sort shells by shape, color, size.

Counting Fingerplay: Count by holding up fingers, show each wave with arms

Five Little Seashells (Traditional Rhyme)

Five little seashells lying on the shore;

Three little seashells all pearly new;

Swish! Went the waves, then there were two.

Fingerplay:

 - A fun lesson in homophones, words that sound the same but with different meanings. Tap along on your lap, while 'seeing' with your hand shading your eyes. Identify body parts such as knees; get creative, have the sailor go to elbows, shoulders, heads.
