### VIII. New Business

## a. 2024 Funding Requests and Recommendations for the 2024 Plan Update (This item was heard out of order, after item V.d.)

Virginia Barker gave an update on the latest information on inflation and the impact on revenue and project costs. For 2023, revenue grew at approximately 3.6%, with expenses increasing at an estimated 6%. She noted that future inflation is expected to remain constant at 2% and provided projections for revenue through 2026. This results in anticipated revenue being less than what was projected last year by approximately \$801,255. It is projected that inflation will mean that projects will be more expensive than previously budgeted, and the "rainbow" table will be updated to show inflation for each project rather than an annual lump sum as has been previously shown. After calculating inflation, updating final costs for completed projects, and removing withdrawn projects, the anticipated funding available for allocation for 2024 Plan is \$10,784,563.

Terri Breeden then reviewed the 2024 Project Funding Requests received for SOIRL COC consideration. A total of 16 project applications were received, but two withdrew from consideration, leaving 14 projects for consideration.

Discussion ensued. Ms. Barker and Ms. Breeden responded to the Committee's questions.

Public Comments were heard.

Vinnie Taranto moved to recommend modifications to the Save Our Indian River Lagoon Project Plan to include the following updates:

- Include all the projects listed in the 2024 Project Funding Request List, with the exception of Projects Numbered 260 and 261 and 262.
- The projects recommended for inclusion in the 2024 Plan Update will be funded as substitutes by removing funding for the following basin projects: Basin 959a, Basin 1434, Basin SJR-97, Basin 1762, Basin 1604.


